The electricity in my house has been shut off. I have paid the unpaid bill. I would like to apply for re-transmission of electricity, but what should I do?

If you fail to pay your electricity bill on time, your electricity will be shut off. First call the electricity company with which you have a contract to find out how to restore electricity. If you have a contract with Tokyo Electric Power Company (TEPCO), you can follow the procedure for restoration by either chatting with them or by voice guidance.

<Chat> On the TEPCO portal site, click on the chat button in the lower right corner and enter "送 電再開(Resumption of Power Transmission)". After answering the questions, the procedure for resumption of power transmission will be completed. You can only type in Japanese.

<Voice Guidance> Call **03-6375-9797** and follow the voice guidance.
